Vikram Soni, a physicist, discussed the ozone hole. He also talked about Earth as a living organism that recycles all the waste that it generates, comparing it to the technology we invent, that does not follow this cycle.

Col (Retd) SG Dalvi, who is a part of the Climate Reality Project - a non-profit organisation, talked about extreme climatic conditions like floods, droughts and hailstorms, which are the outcome of global warming. Focusing on Pune, he said that the water table is going down as the natural percolation rate is reducing because of concretisation. He suggested use of rooftop rainwater harvesting.
